Participation Lodge Grey Bruce has had another impactful year, marked by our ongoing commitment to empowering individuals with complex needs and enhancing their quality of life. This annual report provides a comprehensive overview of our programs and services, highlighting the dedication and hard work for our team, as well as the meaningful experiences of the individuals we support.

Key programs featured in this report include:

Hanover Apartments & Owen Sound Apartments:

These housing initiatives continue to provide stable, supportive environments for individuals, offering them opportunities for independence while receiving the necessary care and support.

Outreach Bathing:

This service has made a significant impact in helping individuals maintain their personal care routines, fostering dignity and well-being.

Kitchen:

Our Kitchen program remains a vital resource, promoting nutrition, independence, and socialization.

Maintenance & Environmental Services:

Our dedicated staff ensure that our facilities are safe, clean, and welcoming, creating an environment where individuals can thrive.

Recreation:

This program continues to offer a wide range of activities that enhance social engagement, physical health, and overall happiness.

Additionally, this report includes a heartfelt recount of the year from one of the individuals living at the Lodge. Their reflections offer a powerful testament to the positive impact of our services and the sense of community we strive to foster.

As we look to the future, we remain focused on our mission to empower and enrich the lives of the individuals we support, working collaboratively to create a more inclusive, meaningful and joyful life for all.

This year, there were a few changes within the Hanover Apartments program. One individual transitioned to a Long-Term Care Home in Durham, and sadly, one of our individuals passed away at the Hanover Hospital. While departures always bring sadness, we were able to welcome two new individuals into the program, each bringing their unique energy and spirit. We remain committed to fostering a welcoming and supportive environment to all those who join our community.

Our dedicated staff team continues to provide consistent care and support, and we were pleased to add several new casual staff members this year. Their fresh perspectives and ideas have strengthened the team and contributed to the ongoing success of the program.



As we move forward, creativity has become an integral part of daily life at Hanover. One individual, a poet, is currently collaborating with a local musician on a song inspired by his poetry. He was even able to participate in the recording process at a music studio in Guelph. His determination was truly inspiring despite the studio being on the second floor, he made the eightflight climb up the stairs independently! This experience was invaluable, and he is eagerly anticipating hearing more of his poetry turned into music.

Another individual celebrated a significant milestone this year with the acquisition of an enclosed mobility scooter, which she has affectionately named "Casper". This scooter has granted her newfound independence, allowing her to attend appointments and explore her town, with her dog riding along in the back seat! Keep an eye out for "Casper" as it makes its way through Hanover - it's truly a one-of-a-kind ride.

Our Blind Gentleman also had an exciting journey this year, traveling to New Jersey for a month to train his new guide dog, "Kenny".

They have returned home and are settling into their routine, with great success

Throughout the year, the individuals at Hanover Apartments have remained active participants in their community, taking part in "Home Fun" activities such as movie and game nights. One of the most anticipated events is our annual water fight between staff and individuals, which is always a highlight and fun of fun — "soakingly fun!"

Owen Sound Apartments

The Owen Sound Apartments program continues to support 10 individuals who show remarkable resilience as they work to regain what they have lost due to significant life events. Their strength and determination are inspiring, and despite the challenges they face, they never shy away from embracing new adventures and creating fresh stories.

Many individuals in our program have been with us for over 20 years, which speaks to the strong, lasting relationships we've built. Our dedicated staff team remains deeply committed to providing the highest quality care and support, helping each individual maintain as much independence as possible. However, as people age, they may encounter more health concerns, which may require us to explore the best options for housing, support, and care moving forward.

The staff team has remained largely unchanged, with a few new casual team members to help support the program. This stability ensures a deep understanding of each individual's needs, and staff continue to incorporate thoughtful timing and multitasking into their daily routines to provide the best care possible.

This year, several individuals have received upgrades to their wheelchairs and other assistive devices, including new electric wheelchairs in vibrant colors like blue and teal - an option that has been greatly appreciated by all!

One individual has also embraced greater independence with the addition of an electric bike, allowing them to explore Owen Sound and improve their mobility, as they are unable to hold a driver's license. This new freedom has made a significant difference in their quality of life.

Owen Sound Apartments

Sadly, "Toby", a feisty little chihuahua who was dearly loved by one of our individuals, passed away, leaving the individual heartbroken. However, when she was ready, she adopted a new companion, "Annie", a sweet little dog who is spoiled not only by her owner but also by the caring staff.

Our resident gardener has continued to thrive, creating several beautiful gardens in the backyard of the apartments. His passion for gardening extends to pickling and jarring, with his creations receiving rave reviews from everyone who tries them. If you ever need gardening advice, he's the go-to expert!

We are excited to share that the new Participation Lodge Cookbook includes some added favourites from our talented "chef" and "baker" in Owen Sound. Both are incredibly proud to have their recipes featured. A highlight is the Chicken Barley Soup, known for its flavourful kick, and the Carrot Christmas Pudding, a family recipe passed down through generations.

The individuals at Owen Sound Apartments continue to inspire us with their perseverance, and we remain committed to providing the support and care they need to lead fulfilling, independent lives.



Outreach Bathing

The Bathing Program continues to operate successfully in Hanover and Markdale, with a new staff member recently hired for Hanover, who has quickly become well-liked by all. Our dedicated Outreach staff provide essential support to individuals in Wiarton, Durham, Hanover, Walkerton, and Owen Sound.

Expanding these services would allow us to reach more individuals across the Grey Bruce area, providing them with the care and support they need. The individuals we serve greatly appreciate the privacy and dignity this program offers, allowing them to remain in their own homes while staying connected to their communities. This helps them maintain their independence without the disruption of moving.

The program's success is built on the independence it fosters, and the confidentiality maintained by both staff and individuals. (As a result, no pictures are included). This ensures the security of the program, reinforcing its long-term need and value.

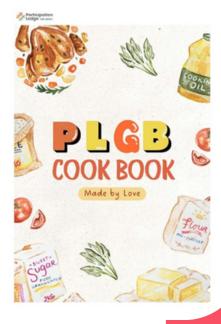
We are proud to be part of such a remarkable program, and we look forward to the possibility of expanding it further in the future to serve even more individuals.

Kitchen

2024 has been a significant year for the kitchen at PLGB. One of the key changes was the successful transition from 11-hour shifts to 8-hour shifts for our full-time cooks. This adjustment allowed us to reinstate staff-paid meals, which had been paused during the COVID-19 pandemic. Now, staff can enjoy breakfast, lunch, or supper at a discounted rate while working at the Lodge.

Our kitchen team, currently consisting of five dedicated staff members, also had the privilege of hosting a summer student in 2024. Samantha joined us in May, and together with the individuals we support, their families, and staff across PLGB, we developed a cookbook filled with family-favourite recipes, a brief history of the Lodge, and pictures of our residents and the Lodge itself. This cookbook will be available for purchase by the public, PLGB families, and staff, with proceeds benefiting our recreation department. We plan to continue this initiative, creating new cookbooks in the years to come.

In addition, we're excited to have a co-op student, Austen, from St. Mary's High School (Bruce-Grey CDSB) join us for the 2024-2025 year. Thanks to Austen's help, we introduced freshly baked cookies and other treats available for purchase by staff. We are also developing a new fundraising project featuring pre-portioned dry mix soups, spice rubs, and cookie mixes in jars. These recipes, created with input from our supported individuals, will be available for purchase, and the proceeds will go toward supporting our recreation department in 2025.



Throughout the year, our kitchen team also catered various events, including a summer BBQ to welcome our 2024 students and a staff appreciation event in October, in collaboration with Burger Chief, a local food truck. One of the highlights was catering a retirement party for Linda McLeod, our interim Executive Director, where our team created beautiful and delicious charcuterie cups that were enjoyed by all.

The PLGB kitchen team continues to innovate and contribute to the overall success of the Lodge, creating not only delicious meals but also opportunities to raise funds for important programs. We look forward to further developments and community engagement in the coming years.





In 2024, the Maintenance and EVS teams worked relentlessly to improve and enhance the facilities at PLGB, creating a more welcoming and functional environment for everyone.

One of the year's highlights was a volunteer painting event led by Jeff Lockwood and his company, Lockwood Painting, based in Chatsworth. With paint and supplies generously donated by Sherwin Williams, Jeff's team and volunteers helped refresh the main lobby, residential wing, and dining/TV room. Plans are in place for the team to return to update the vacation wing in fall 2024 or spring 2025.





The Maintenance team also hosted a summer student, Megan, whose contributions were invaluable in completing numerous tasks across the PLGB grounds. Major updates this year included the renovation of both SGL tub rooms with state-of-theart soaker tubs, new ceiling lifts with tracks, and updated tub chairs. Five aging ceiling lifts in residential bedrooms were also replaced.





A significant project was the much-anticipated renovation of the skylight in the main Lodge lobby. The new design not only enhances the building's appearance but is also expected to significantly reduce heating and cooling costs.

This year, we partnered with Sign Makers in London, Ontario, to design and install a beautiful menu board, activity board, and logo sign in the main lobby, ensuring consistent branding for PLGB. Additionally, with Holm Graphics from Walkerton, we completed signage for our newly renovated gym, yoga/dance studio, and rebranded sensory room, all of which are ready for use by our supported individuals in 2024-2025.







Renovations continued with the transformation of two storage areas into additional office spaces - one on the main floor and one in the basement - providing much-needed workspaces for our team.

Our EVS department, comprising of eight dedicated staff members, has continued to adapt to evolving Public Health guidelines and policies. Their work ensures high-quality cleaning and laundry services, making them the first line of defense for the health and safety of staff and supported individuals.

To show appreciation for the EVS team, we celebrated EVS week in 2024 with some well deserved sweet treats. Their passion and commitment to excellence remain vital to our operations and the wellbeing of everyone at PLGB.







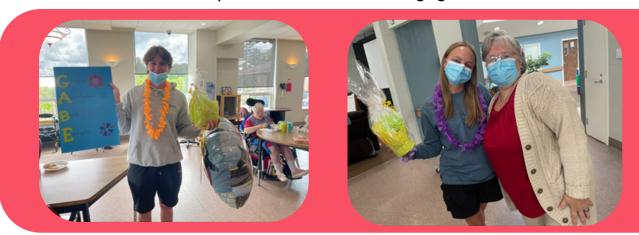




Recreation

The Recreation Department plays a vital role in supporting the well-being of every individual at PLGB. Recreation is more than just leisure; it's a pathway for individuals to discover themselves, build meaningful relationships, and connect with their community. Whether fostering joy, pursuing passions, or achieving personal goals, recreation enriches lives and promotes healthier, happier lifestyles.

Our approach focuses on individual goals, life satisfaction, personal growth, and community connection. Through group activities and tailored programs, we aim to enhance independence and social engagement.



Morning Group Activities

We've found that mornings bring the highest participation for group activities. These sessions are divided into two categories:

- 1. **Active Engagement** Activities such as stretching, bowling, scavenger hunts, nature walks, games at Luther Ranch, or even creating ribbon dances encourage movement and energy.
- 2. **Creative and Reflective Engagement** Less physically intensive options include crafts, bingo, karaoke, literature time, online word games, or even Survivor-themed challenges.

This year, the Recreation Department - comprising one full-time and one parttime staff member, along with two fantastic summer students - offered an array of memorable activities and events:

- Painting and Art Therapy with Lesley Banks: Monthly art sessions adapted to each person's skills and interests, complete with the added therapeutic presence of Lesley's dogs.
- Bluegrass Jam Sessions: Monthly gatherings from September to June in Owen Sound, where one of our supported individuals actively participates with the group.
- Hope Haven Horse Therapy:

 December, fostering personal
 growth and connection.
- Breakfast Club: A much-loved activity where individuals plan, prepare, and enjoy their chosen meals in small groups.
- Meaford Scarecrow Invasion
 Parade: Supported individuals contributed to float planning, decoration, and participation, celebrating community connection.

- Community Theatre and Concerts:
 Providing opportunities for individuals to enjoy live performances, fulfilling personal goals, and boosting community interaction.
- Family and Friend Visits:
 Maintaining strong personal relationships through regular visits, special events, and digital connections.
- Blue Jays Games: A highlight of the summer, offering a fun and inclusive outing for all.

December 13th onward PLGB was in quarantine due to a COVID outbreak. All outings were cancelled as 17/22 became ill. All supported persons were in their rooms. Many thanks to the kitchen staff and PSWs we prepared, delivered and fed residents. PSW's changed linen and made each resident comfortable during the day. Thanks to all, including Administration who worked around the clock, supporting us.

Our Secret Santa Gift Exchange was held on December 20th. Santa came with his sack full of wrapped presents. I remember thinking that Santa was very thin this year, but he made up for it at the "cookie and beverage table". While eating, each of us examined our gift and showed it off to others.

Each supported person has a Key Contact and at Christmas time, they go shopping for us. There was not enough power/torque and the lift would not come up or go down on the bus we were in. Therefore, no residents could transfer. We called the Fire Station and 911 but "J" was able to fix it enough to lower 5 supported residents. We were so cold as the doors had to be open (smoke insite the bus). Then once outside we waited until we could get on the Promaster. We arrive home at 8:00 cold and starving. Mac and weenies hit the spot!
- Our last event was a Thanksgiving feast with all the trimmings including apple or pumpkin pie. A big thank you to all the chefs!

This year has been one of growth, connection, and cherished memories for our individuals living at the Lodge. Their stories remind us of the resilience, joy, and community spirit that define life at PLGB.
